

Finding Wisdom in Scripture and Community: Holding Grief and Hope at the Same Time

How do we bring forth insight from ancient scriptures to meet our challenges today? As Nahum Ward-Lev says, "As a rabbi and a lifelong student of the Hebrew Scriptures, I find Biblical wisdom speaking into the present moment with more relevance and power than at any other time in my life. . . We are called to learn how to peaceably relinquish the old world and how to imaginatively give birth to a new world in which all life can flourish. These Scriptures, the Torah and the Prophets in particular, were gathered and edited to meet the needs of the Israelite people who had suffered the catastrophe of the Babylonian destruction and subsequent exile in the sixth century BCE. These writings were held sacred because they helped people absorb the loss of the world they had known and offered a vision for a way forward." Now is one of those times when we may dig into our rich traditions to find our way forward.

During the 1960 to 1996 civil war in Guatemala, our brothers and sisters formed two committees, one to collect and bury the dead and one to celebrate life moving forward. It seems to me that we are in a time of holding mixed emotions. We're staring at a changed world, living in pockets of isolation, and striving to find ways to cope, acknowledge loss, and move forward in hope.

Many of our small groups have become like the home churches of the early Jewish and Christian diasporas. Outreach groups, Caring groups, Fellowship Groups, Presbyterian Women Circles, Youth Groups, Study groups and Sunday Schools continue to find ways to meet. We can still serve and see one another, though now it's limited to Zoom, small groups and small outdoor gatherings. Keep an eye out for new small groups that are starting. Perhaps these limitations help us to be more intentional about how we do meet. I've noticed that we are listening better, choosing our words more carefully, staying attentive to our emotions, and being extra sensitive to care in the community. We're feeling more pain, but we're learning to give even more. May we be judged as Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. said, "by the content of our character." So as we continue to watch worship, start up outdoors worship, and gather carefully in small groups, may we carry forth this new awareness that we, like our forebears in faith, are called to live in the abundance of Christ's love and grace, giving birth to a new world in which all life can flourish.

This public art installation seeks to remind our community of the need for **peace**.

Peace is broadly understood: world peace, inner peace, an end to violence and intolerance. We will create pinwheels, add written prayers to them, and display our pinwheels on the front lawn of our church. Our goal is 600 pinwheels adorning our lawn, and conveying to our community our prayers for all of us, and the world.

Pinwheels for Peace was born out of a public school art project in Florida in 2015. It was originally associated with the World Day for Peace on September 21 of that year (visit pinwheelsforpeace.com). Our installation will span a longer period of time not including 9/21, but the witness for peace in our community, nation, and world will be no less powerful.

Our pinwheel project seeks to build on the red pinwheels we enjoyed at Pentecost this year, adding a layer of "prayer engagement." We hope you enjoy creating your pinwheel(s), but more importantly that you use this experience to focus your mind, heart, and spirit on the need for peace in our world and in our lives.

Pinwheel kits are available under the portico at the front doors of the church.

Helping to Feed Homeless in our Area

In the fall, BMPC normally participates in two events that provide food for our area homeless. One event is Homeward Bound's – Room in the Inn (RITI) program where we host women with the UMC for a week, in their church house. The other is providing meals for a week to the SVCM winter shelter. These projects have taken a different form because of COVID-19. Homeward Bound is housing the homeless community at a Red Roof Inn in Asheville, including the women we normally accommodate through RITI. The SVCM shelter will also be different with details being worked out.

In lieu of food collection, we would like to show our support through monetary contributions. Through October 14, we will be collecting funds for these two efforts to support our community. Our goal is to provide Homeward Bound and SVCM funds to purchase meals for one week for the populations that we would normally support. Although providing funds is less personal than cooking a pot of chili, it keeps us connected with those most in need.

Library News

The library again has been the recipient of more generous donations from BMPC members. One was written by BMPC clergy member George B. Thompson, Jr. It is a departure from his other works, which are nonfiction. *What Hardy Found* is an engaging novel, the main character of which is twelve-year-old Hardy Newkirk, who has just moved to a new town in Appalachia. Hardy faces the usual excitement, as well as trauma, of being the new kid in school and adjusting to a different environment. While the novel is a good read for teenagers, this senior citizen had difficulty putting it down. It is more than the story of an adolescent struggling with changes; it is also a mystery, as Hardy discovers something strange on one of his forays into the woods surrounding his new home. There is still another layer to this novel, as Hardy learns that suspicion and prejudice are prevalent in this community, although much of it appears beneath the surface. Intriguing plot, well-drawn characters, and a much needed message – all are found in *What Hardy Found*.


Surely Goodness And Mercy, the other new donation to the library is not, as one might think from the title, a book of devotions on Psalm 23. The subtitle, *A Journey Into Illness And Solidarity*, however, describes well the content of this inspiring, painful, and challenging work. Murphy Davis, the author of the book, is well-known to many students of Columbia Seminary who have volunteered at the Open Door Community, She, along with Ed Loring, to whom

she is married, founded and ran this welcoming facility in downtown Atlanta for persons who were homeless and those who had been recently released from prison. The Open Door Community figures largely in this story of a devastating illness and personal journey of fear and hope.

In 1995 Murphy was given a diagnosis of cancer. For well over twenty years she has battled surgeries, treatments, recoveries – then more diagnoses, surgeries, treatments, and recoveries. She goes into great detail at times of her experiences, including the times of despair and the times of relief and even joy. The last verse of Psalm 23, reflected in the title, became a mantra, in a way, for her. Her personal struggle is only one theme of the book. The other, which is beautifully and often agonizingly woven into her story, is that of the plight of the poor and the marginalized. The problems with health care, racism, white privilege, and the death penalty, among others of social justice, are delineated vividly and passionately. This book has probably impacted me as much as any that I have read in quite a while. Anyone who wishes to order a copy may find some cards on the cart telling how one may do so.

A reminder that the library has added a number of other books relating to various current issues – these are still on display on the shelves immediately to the right as one goes into the library. Please come in, browse, and check out. -Sally Woodard





October 23-25, 2020 | Online or in Montreat What's Essential: Discerning the Church's Work Amid the Twin Pandemics of Structural Racism and COVID-19

Our goal is to provide participants with capacity-building tools and resources to work for antiracist transformation in their churches and institutions. Participants will finish this antiracism training with concrete action steps for their congregations and local communities.

This Crossroads antiracism training will specifically address the political challenges facing the church in light of how the coronavirus pandemic has laid bare the acute structural inequities of the USA and their impact on communities of color, particularly Black, Indigenous, and Immigrant communities. Given the coronavirus pandemic and its disproportionate impact, our antiracism training will also address how the church is called to be a political actor. What and where is the Church being called to do and be?

Dr. Reggie Williams – Keynoter

Dr. Reggie Williams is the associate professor of Christian ethics at McCormick Theological Seminary in Chicago, IL. Williams' book Bonhoeffer's Black Jesus: Harlem Renaissance Theology and an Ethic of Resistance (Baylor University Press, 2014) was selected as a Choice Outstanding Title in 2015, in the field of religion. 
This year's event will look a little different. We are not able to gather together to walk, but that does not mean you cannot participate in helping raise needed funds for our food pantry.
