# **Cultivating Congregational Life**

My position as Pastor of Congregational Faith Formation offers the joys and challenges of working with all the members and guests who are a part of this congregation and community! Sounds a little unwieldy? Kinda like when I was a teenager and my father and I delivered solid mahogany high boys with delicately carved trim on Christmas Eve. Unwieldy, but worth the effort to be like Santa.

Let's bring this down to earth. Most folks think of church as worship, praising God at 9 and 11 on Sunday morning with scriptures, a sermon, and prayers - baptisms and the Lord's Supper occasionally. Mary Katherine, Bob, Alice, Mike, Jackie, Brittany, Sam and I support all these things with the elders and deacons. But we all know that there's a lot more that we want out of our church and that our personal faith and spirituality are not limited to the list above. If I make a list of what "congregational life" is, it won't make things too much clearer because we don't work in silos and in isolation. Our leadership is all about collaboration and teamwork - inviting, engaging, equipping and sharing in faith formation – all acts of growing in discipleship and Christian community. We work in teams, and all the teams overlap. So at the risk of being reductionists, let's remember some well loved aspects of congregational life that are returning this summer and fall!

Support for over 30 service agencies – **Outreach and Global Mission** 

Stewardship and energy education, green practices, study and gardening for the poor – **Earth Care** 

Visitation to our homebound members, to Highland Farms and other retirement communities – **Pastoral Care** 

Faith Growth with our families with children 0-18 – **Children, Youth, and Family ministry** 

Fellowship, support, and affinity Groups – **Small Groups** 

Addressing racial justice issues - Racial Equity Task Force

Teams that work to keep the church building, operations, and programs running – **Session and Team Leadership** 

As Presbyterians, we don't isolate our devotional life from our daily actions in community, it's all related to our being a child of God in God's gathered church. Congregational life is a welcoming, resourceful, part of being a faithful community that share the love, justice, and grace of Christ. It is a joy to be connected to so many of you who are a part of renewing our life together!

# Montreat Women's Connection 2021


Word Wise: Encountering the Word that Draws Us In and Sends Us Out

# **Green Burial**: An Alternative for Laying Loved Ones to Rest

Carolina Memorial Sanctuary, located south of the Asheville Regional Airport, is a conservation and green cemetery that offers "a peaceful and contemplative environment in which to lay loved ones to rest." The Sanctuary offers a third alternative, in addition to embalming or traditional cremation, that uses no harmful materials. According to the website, the Sanctuary is available for the natural burial of humans, pets, or cremated remains at one-half to one-third the cost of contemporary burials.

Each year, an estimated 20 million board feet of wood (77,000 trees), 4.3 million gallons of embalming fluids, 1.6 million tons of reinforced concrete, 17,000 tons of copper and bronze, and 64,500 tons of steel are buried in American cemeteries. At the Carolina Memorial Sanctuary, burial containers are completely biodegradable and chemical-free. Choices include a basket, a simple linen or cotton shroud, a strong box of cardboard, or an unadorned, untreated wooden box, preferrably pine.

A family can choose a burial site in woodlands, a meadow, or creekside. Land restoration is ongoing in all of these areas, and land is protected from development in perpetuity. Grave markers are of native stone originating on site, which may be selected, taken for engraving, and then placed at the grave.

Two other sites in the Asheville area are certified by the Green Burial Council. Green Hills Cemetery on New Leicester Highway and Forest Lawn in Candler are defined as "hybrid" cemeteries, "which offer conventional burials in some sections but in other areas prohibit vaults, embalming, and non-natural burial containers."

Warren Wilson Professor Mallory McDuff has a new book to be released in the fall titled *Our Last Best Act*, about environmentally responsible end-of-life planning.

#### Demystifying Solar Panels for Homeowners

Originally planned for April 2020, and postponed due to Covid, the Earth Care Team has now scheduled "Demystifying Solar Panels for Homeowners" for

Thursday, September 30, 7:00-8:30 p.m., in fellowship hall.

The team is in the process of contacting speakers from two solar installation companies (*Sugar Hollow Solar* and *MB Haynes Corporation*) and one from *Duke Energy*. People who already have solar will also be present to join in the discussion and answer individual questions after the program.

## Topics to be covered include:

- What solar technology is now available for homeowners?
- What should we know about costs

   state and/or federal tax rebates,
   other incentives or rebates, buying
   vs. renting the panels. How does the billing from Duke Energy work?
- What is the process for exploring whether solar will work for you, and what factors determine whether this is practical for you?

For the church house renovation/rebuilding, all invoices will go first to Wayne Mullis, our rock-star volunteer project manager. Checks will be reviewed and signed by our volunteer team of approved check signers. All of this is being tracked digitally and with hardcopy, and any congregant with questions on campaign finances is welcome to set up a time with me to review the books, including paid invoices, account balance, cash flow statements, and more. As always, individual contribution information will be held in the strictest confidence.

I am so excited that we are breaking ground with renovations, and for the possibilities that await us in the sanctuary and fellowship hall. Thank you all, once again, for the amazing generosity you show through your time, your talents, and your financial contributions to the work and mission of this church.

#### A Healthy Weekday School Year!


Wow! I can't believe summer is upon us and another school year has come to an end. What a year it has been! With all the uncertainty last summer, we were not sure we would actually have school. However, we pushed through and did a lot of research

and were able to successfully open with a slightly reduced staff and child count. We made it the entire nine months with no Covid cases in our staff or children!

Plans are under way for the fall. We will return to full capacity in September with 11 staff, 68 children, and a long waiting list for each class.

Thank you for supporting us through

the use of your Ingles Advantage cards. With the funds that we earned, we were able to purchase \$2,400 in supplies and equipment this year. All card links are cancelled out at the end of May so in August we will have to relink our Advantage Cards as


