In the last two years, we have learned a lot about what it means to be church. We have discovered we can connect in surprising ways: through the imperfect miracle of technology, through Zoom meetings, campfire vespers and meetings, small groups, phone calls, cards and waves from across the street. We have enjoyed music we have made over the years, and are making new music for this time. We have prayed with and for one another, especially as we have lost so many of our treasured saints.

As we have joined back together over the past year, we have explored new ways of worshiping with three new services: Family Worship, Taizé/Contemplative, and Take Five @ 5. All of these have been received with much enthusiasm!

In January, the Music and Worship Arts ministry team began to explore what 2022 summer worship would look like at BMPC. We discussed my impending summer sabbatical, construction happening in the fellowship hall, kitchen, and hallways, and the newly renovated church house being ready to use and celebrate. How could we streamline the variety of worship experiences without watering down our love of worship?

In my seven years as pastor, every single year we have explored the idea of partnering with Montreat Conference Center for their summer worship series but for various reasons, we have never followed through in that decision.

We wondered how this opportunity would affect our spiritual and worship lives here at BMPC? How would it shape us to hear a different preacher and voice every single Sunday at Montreat? Could we put a great deal of energy into preparing the 9 a.m. worship in the sanctuary with a guest preacher? Could we make space and partner with Montreat to support a large community service at 10:30, and could we incorporate some of what we have learned with our smaller services in a 6 p.m. worship, music, and fellowship time at the church house? With every question we grew more excited and curious.

Consequently, at our March stated meeting the Worship team sent an action item to the Session in the spirit of exploration and curiosity and it was unanimously passed. We believe that this is the summer to join in partnership with Montreat worship. So, over the summer months from Memorial Day to Labor Day, our summer worship will be:

SANCTUARY BLENDED SERVICE: 9:00 a.m.

MONTREAT SUMMER WORSHIP: 10:30 a.m. June 5-August 7
GATHERED AT SIX: 6 p.m. outside at the church house

We pray that all of our members will enjoy these options in this spirit of exploration and curiosity! There will also be many opportunities sponsored by the Congregational Life ministry team to join together for fellowship and fun. We look forward to trying out this new summer schedule and then evaluating in the fall when I get back from my sabbatical.



A Thursday Night Live Program You Won't Want to Miss

The program will feature *At the River: A Memoir of Struggle and Grace in the Segregated South*, a documentary produced by our own Carolyn Crowder with music by Aaron Price. Carolyn, raised in Montgomery, Alabama, during the Civil Rights era, asked Presbyterian ministers who had taken stands during those turbulent times, two questions:

"When did you realize that what you were being taught was wrong?"

"How did you dare to take a stand?"

The ministers she interviewed were often isolated in small towns in the Deep South and chose to be brave despite the dangerous circumstances. For the feature length documentary, Carolyn traveled throughout the Southeast interviewing ministers, now in their 80's and 90's, about their experiences and what it took to go against the racist currents during those hard days within their local communities and congregations.

The documentary lasts two hours with a discussion afterwards. Light refreshments will be available.

Eastern Band of Cherokee Approves Land Acknowledgment from BMPC

Karen Austin, chair of the Earth Care Team, recently contacted Chief Sneed of the Eastern Band of Cherokee, asking approval of a statement acknowledging that our church rests on former Cherokee land. Below is the statement followed by the response from Chief Sneed:

"To promote cultural understanding and honor our faith's call for truth and reconciliation, we acknowledge that we are gathered to worship, learn, and work on the traditional lands of the Cherokee."

"Chief Sneed is very appreciative of your concern in checking with him to receive the Tribe's approval of, and participation in, your planned land acknowledgment. We think the proposed statement is a beautiful way to phrase the acknowledgment."

Alternative Ways To Travel

Some scientists point out that the best energy we save is that which we never burn in the first place. "Leave it in the ground" is their rallying cry. No one method of saving energy is possible for everyone, but collectively church members are practicing low-impact living by driving electric cars, installing solar panels, adding more insulation and better windows, growing gardens, moving to smaller homes, teaching classes, and studying together. This spring some are learning about "green burials" and re-thinking their final arrangements.

As summer approaches, we may be ready to think more seriously about air travel. Not only does it take massive amounts of fossil fuel to lift, for instance, two people plus their luggage plus their share of the plane's weight and fuel 30,000 feet into the air and propel them thousands of miles, but the jet's contrails, frozen water vapor, act as a lid on a steaming pot, trapping heat in.

One alternative to a long-distance trip is enjoying a "stay-cation." Using your home for lodging, play tourist here in the mountains with family and friends, enjoying outdoor activities, scenery, restaurants and many area attractions. Another is to widen your radius to, say, 200 miles, which allows you to vacation in one of many towns and cities within a five or six-state area.

Yet another way to travel to fabulous places from home is through watching documentaries. President Barack Obama narrates a new five-part series that celebrates our planet's national parks and wild spaces. The series spans five continents, including footage from parks in Monterey Bay, California; Tsavo National Park in Kenya; and Gunung Leuser National Park in the rainforests of Indonesia. Each episode tells the story of a national park through the lives of its wildest residents and explores our changing relationship with wilderness.

Any documentary by BBC producer David Attenborough in his seven decades filming the wild is outstanding. Of special interest are *Planet Earth* (eleven episodes, 2006) *Blue Planet II* (six episodes, 2017), and especially *A Life on Our Planet*, which shows parts of the Earth as he first saw and filmed them decades ago and as they look today. In this case, pictures are more powerful than words, showing the decline of the Earth from 1954, when the world population was 2.7 billion, and wilderness was 64 percent of the globe, to 2020, when the world population is 7.8 billion and the remaining wilderness only 35 percent.

These series are beyond spectacular, affording the viewer breathtaking experiences in lieu of trying to find them by travel.

Library News from Sally Woodard

CREATION CARE

Two very recent donations by people in the congregation are also recent publications, one in 2021 and the other in 2022. In addition, both books are concerned with timely and controversial issues, the kind of issues which we may want to avoid when talking with certain members of our family and some of our friends. What are the issues? Climate change and racism.

April 22 is a relatively new holiday in this country and one not necessarily observed by all Americans. It is, however, for many of us a very important one. Earth Day, a time to recognize the harm that human actions inflict upon our planet, is less a celebration and more a challenge to make us increasingly aware of what we can and should do to reverse the damage to our earthly home. Katharine Hayhoe, who identifies as a climate scientist and Evangelical Christian, is the author of

NATIONAL BESTSELLER A CLIMATE SCIENTIST'S CASE FOR HOPE AND HEALING IN A DIVIDED WORLD KATHARINE HAYHOE

Saving Us A Climate Scientist's Case For Hope and Healing in a Divided World. Dr. Hayhoe believes that talking about the issue rather than avoiding it is the best hope for helping others to understand the huge problem that faces the world. However,

she also realizes that "talk" can often result in hopeless arguments and frequently vile characterizations and epithets of the "other." She tells some of her own experiences in this regard.

The book focuses on the ways in which we can talk to those with whom we disagree, not only by relating facts, but also by finding common interests and concerns, issues on which we can agree. While it isn't always easy, she does believe it is possible, and she wants Christians, in particular, to seek those ways to

communicate. Dr. Hayhoe is passionate in her desire to see average people engage in conversations that show how important even a small step can make a difference. Saving Us is an excellent guide for any and all of us to

help save our planet.

Remember that BMPC has other books on creation care, a few in the library on a shelf labeled **Creation Care**, and a full library in CR1 opposite the Fellowship Hall.

The other donation with a timely topic is **Wait – Is This Racist?**

A Guide to Becoming an Anti-Racist Church written by

Kerry Connelly, who also wrote Good White Racist. Bryana Clover and Josh Riddick contributed to the text. This book is more than a guide for churches, although much of the substance is directed to that end. Any Christian can benefit from the examples related and the advice given.



The co-authors, Josh and Bryana, bring additional voices from their own experiences, which taught them not only about underlying racism in churches but also about the lack of diversity many times in other ways. Questions such as: Who really benefits from mission trips? What do the faces in children's books look like? How convenient are the facilities for the less abled? These questions can make us all more aware of the ways in which we ignorantly practice a lack of diversity.
