# Earth Care According to Aldo Leopold and Bill McKibben

The Earth Care Book Group has launched a year-long study of *American Earth: Environmental Writing Since Thoreau*, edited by Bill McKibben. Featured this month are passages from Aldo Leopold, known as the father of environmental ethics and also the founder of wildlife management in the US; and Bill McKibben, author of *The End of Nature*, the first book to warn the general public about the climate crisis. These authors from two different centuries tell us that our ordinary lives of consumption are ending nature. We need to form a new ethic for living on the planet.

### A Sand County Almanac by Aldo Leopold, 1949

We all strive for safety, prosperity, comfort, long life, and dullness, the most of us with machines, votes, and dollars, but it all comes to the same thing. Too much safety seems to yield only danger in the long run. Perhaps this is behind Thoreau's dictum: In wildness is the salvation of the world.

The land ethic simply enlarges the boundaries of the community to include soils, waters, plants, and animals, or collectively the land. This sounds simple: do we not already sing our love for and obligation to the land of the free and the home of the brave? Yes, but just what and whom do we love? Certainly not the soil, which we are sending helter-skelter downriver. Certainly not the waters, which we assume have no function except to turn turbines, float barges, and carry off sewage. Certainly not the plants, of which we exterminate whole communities without batting an eye. Certainly not the animals, of which we have already extirpated many of the largest and most beautiful species.

The usual answer to this dilemma is "more conservation education." As I understand it, the content is substantially this: obey the law, vote right, join some organizations, and practice what conservation is profitable on your own land; the government will do the rest. Is not this formula too easy to accomplish anything worth-while? It defines no right or wrong, assigns no obligation, calls for no sacrifice, implies no change in the current philosophy of values. In respect of land-use, it urges only enlightened self-interest.

# The Flag, the Cross, and the Station Wagon by Bill McKibben, 2022

If you're sixty, 82 percent of the world's fossil fuel emissions have occurred in your lifetime. For three-quarters of your adult life you've known about the dangers of the climate crisis, but it hasn't impinged much if at all on your lifestyle. However, in November of 2020, researchers surveying people aged 26 to 45 found that 96 percent of them were "very or extremely concerned about the wellbeing of their potential future children in a climate-changed world."

We might react to this heartbreaking concern in three ways. Many among us pretend it doesn't exist which is easy to do. We might care for our own family and friends, and volunteer to take care of some other people in our community. All this is find and good but it's sort of what got us into this mess. Consider this third reaction: recognize that young people have led the way so far on climate change. We don't want them to be cannon fodder in this fight. It's time for people who've spend their lives pouring carbon into the air to step up too.



# Library News from Sally Woodard

As I write this, I have learned of the death of prominent author, theologian, and preacher, Frederick Buechner, at the age of 96. Buechner was, among many other distinctions, a prolific writer. Since I have reviewed his books before in this column, now I will simply recount the various kinds of writing that he did. He did not restrict his works to one genre. He wrote novels, devotional books, collections of sermons, and a threevolume autobiography, as well as delving into more serious theology. I will put on the display shelf the works the BMPC library has.



Last month I talked about biographies. At the time I didn't realize that the library had been given Will Campbell and the **Soul of the South** by Thomas L. Connelly. For those to whom his name may not be familiar, Will Campbell was a "folksy" preacher who defied the

stereotypes. He was at home in a bar, playing country and gospel songs on his guitar, as well as advocating for the rights of southern blacks, Vietnam protesters, and people on death row. To say that he was a "colorful" figure in his time is an understatement. Educated at Yale Divinity School, he was still comfortable with the poor and the uneducated. This is not a long biography, but it is a very readable one about a man who had a great impact on the lives of many.


Another recent gift is **Our Last Best Act** by Mallory McDuff, well-known to many here as a professor at Warren Wilson College and an avid environmentalist.

Recently several in the church have read her earlier book, Natural Saints. In this one, she explores the various end-of-life choices with which a person is faced. While the topic may appear to be depressing, it is a vital one for those who are concerned about the environment. McDuff



emphasizes that our care for our planet and humanity should extend to the ways in which we make decisions about our bodies as we are dying and after death.

Many in the congregation are likely familiar with Richard Foster, author of Celebration of Discipline. In *Longing For God*, he has teamed with Gayle D. Beebe to explore "Seven Paths Of Christian Devotion." The authors name seven ways in which they believe Christian devotion is exemplified, and then proceed to



examine how various spiritual leaders have treated one specific aspect of those paths. Among the twenty-six noted figures, they include Origen, Augustine, Francis of Assisi, Julian of Norwich, Teresa of Avila, Luther, Wesley, George Herbert, and John Bunyan,

and many more who are familiar to church history. Longing For God is one of those books into which one can dip and find inspiration without reading it "cover to cover."

Please come by and "check out" the library.
