
Everyone can be generous.

FROM THE EARTH CARE TEAM

Activities

- Bring your own dishes! After the well attended Picnic at Camp Rockmont on September 11, all the dishes, cups and utensils were hauled back to the church and washed, dried, and put away that night, a real labor of love. BMPC has successfully changed from using throw-away dishes and utensils to washable ones, but this year's goal is to form a new habit: Bring your own tableware from home, take it back home and wash it after events involving food. Look for more reminders!
- Members of the Earth Care Team attended the August meeting of the Asheville City Council and spoke supporting a resolution to ban single-use plastics (bags and Styrofoam cups) in the city.
- Members of the Earth Care Team attended the September meeting of the Black Mountain Town Council and spoke supporting a thoughtful proposal brought by the Givens Highland Farms Sustainability Committee. The proposal urged the Black Mountain Town Council to adopt a Climate Action Plan, emphasizing three points: 1) retrofit new and existing buildings; 2) purchase/replace all new/existing vehicles with electric vehicles; 3) update infrastructure with renewable options.

Earth Care Book Study, Mondays, 1:15-2:15

Read and discuss classic and current environmental writings that guide us in our practices and understanding of eco-theology, economics, activism, and community. Led by David Carter Florence and other members of the Earth Care Team. We meet outside whenever possible.

Earth Care According to St. Francis of Assisi

The Earth Care Book Group has launched a year-long study of *American Earth: Environmental Writing Since Thoreau*, edited by Bill McKibben (*Library of America*, 2008). This month, along with our Blessing of the Animals with St. James Episcopal Church on October 2, we are sharing a passage about St. Francis of Assisi by Lynn White of Stanford University. Professor White, who believed that "the seeds of environmental destruction lie in the Christian worldview: that man should hold dominion over nature," agreed with St. Francis, who believed in the equality of all creatures, including man.

From *The Historical Roots of Our Ecological Crisis* by Lynn White, (Science, March 10, 1967):

"The greatest spiritual revolutionary in Western history, Saint Francis proposed what he thought was an alternative Christian view of nature and man's relation to it: he tried to substitute the idea of the equality of all creatures, including man, for the idea of man's limitless rule of creation. He failed. Both our present science and our present technology are so tinctured with orthodox Christian arrogance toward nature that no solution for our ecological crisis can be expected from them alone. Since the roots of our trouble are so largely religious, the remedy must also be essentially religious, whether we call it that or not. We must rethink and refeel our nature and destiny. The profoundly religious, but heretical, sense of the primitive Franciscans for the spiritual autonomy of all parts of nature may point a direction. I propose Francis as a patron saint for ecologists.



Library News from Sally Woodard

Do you have a favorite translation of the Bible? Many people in my age bracket often say that they still love the KJV. It is what they heard in church in their very youngest years. Others like the RSV, which was published in the early 50's. That was, for me, the first time I had heard or read Scripture in what seemed to me to be the way the average person talked. Since the advent of the RSV, there have been a number of other translations or paraphrases, which employ more current expressions of the English language. The BMPC library has many of these on the shelves.

Recently, the library has acquired two newer versions, both of which have been published in this century.

The Voice is the title of a translation of the Ecclesia Society. The most outstanding characteristic is probably the way that passages with dialogue are structured. Those sections look more like a dialogue for a play than what we are accustomed to seeing. The Voice contains a number of study aids, some of them around the chapter itself, many others in the back. As one might expect, the language

sounds ordinary to our ears.

In the introduction, the editors offer a prayer that this version of Holy Scripture may bring healing to First Nations, who have suffered so much "under the dominance of colonial governments who, with the help of churches and missionary organizations, often took our land, our languages, our culture, and even our

children." A feature of this translation that may, at least at first, appear to be disconcerting, are the names for Deity (with the exception of Creator and Great Spirit, which are apparent), human beings, and places. Jesus is often referred to as Creator Sets Free; John the Baptist is Gift of Goodwill; Peter is Stands on the Rock; Seed Planter Village is Galilee; and Land of Promise is Judea. There is no need to be concerned that the reader will forget who or what each name designates; the editors put the familiar names in parentheses each time. While this may not be the best study Bible, it is an intriguing translation and one which may enlighten us more about our indigenous neighbors.

Among the other versions available in the library are some which are very familiar, such as the NRSV and NIV (also the TNIV with somewhat less formal language). Eugene Peterson's very popular *The Message* is still one of my several favorites, and there is one with which I was not very familiar, *The New Century Bible*. The copy in the library is called *The Everyday Bible*, probably because the first pages contain daily Scriptures for

every day in a year. If you are looking for a daily devotional resource, this would be a good one.

This list does not exhaust all of the different translations of Holy Scripture that are in the library, but during the month of October, you may look on the display shelves to the right as you enter and find differing versions. Reading God's word in more than one translation is excellent for study, as well as for devotional practice.
