#### **BACKPACK BUDDIES**

It's that time again. It seems that summer always flies by. Buncombe County Schools begin on Monday, August 28, so we have just a few weeks to get everything together this year.

#### Collection of supplies will begin on Sunday, August 6, in the parlor and will be picked up on Sunday, August 20.

Supplies will be gathered and delivered to Grove Stone Baptist Church which is the Hand in Hand delivery point. Volunteers will sort the items during this week into separate areas for the primary, elementary, middle, and high schoolaged children. For example, crayons would go to primary and elementary while college-ruled paper would go to the high schools. Small backpacks would go to the younger children, while the large backpacks would go to the middle and high schools. Once everything has been divided and boxed up, volunteers will deliver the supplies to the six schools in the Owen district. The intention is to get everything delivered before school starts on August 28.

Each school has a closet where the school supplies are kept. When a teacher sees a need, the child is sent to the counselor to pick what they need out of that supply closet. This allows the child to get what they need in private.

Hand in Hand is a local faith-based nonprofit working with local churches and businesses to help the children and teachers at the six Owen district schools. We are blessed to be a mission partner with Black Mountain Presbyterian Church. Our valley students need our help to be successful in school and this is a big part of that success.

classroom where space is still available. We have a staff of ten and 61 children are enrolled so far.

This year we had eight families on scholarships and gave out a total of \$16,000 in scholarship monies. #### WHAT BIRDS NEED: LEAVE WILD NATURE ALONE

"In the five days we spent there (in a cabin on the Cumberland Plateau), we walked in an endless garden — Queen Anne's lace and forest tickseed, Carolina horse nettle and narrowleaf vervain, annual fleabane and zigzag spiderwort and oxeye daisies were all growing untended on the side of the road. The woods were filled with songbirds: bluejays and goldfinches and tufted titmice and chickadees and bluebirds and even the secretive scarlet tanager. Tanagers generally keep to the treetops, but the trees growing in the soil of Lost Cove reach up to the edge of the bluff. From our own perch, we had a bird's eye view of the trees. We watched a pair of red-tailed hawks teaching their fledglings to hunt. We listened to a pileated woodpecker's wild cry from the top of a dead tree and heard a red fox barking in the dark as two barred owls called to each other: Who, who, who cooks for you? At Lost Cove, the nights are as beautiful as the days. The fireflies come out to fill the forest just as the stars come out to fill the skies."

#### WHAT MIGRATING BIRDS SEE AS THEY FLY

"The land is a sharp reflection of the worldview of the peoples who care for it, or don't. Orioles fly over hundreds of miles of land degraded by the outcomes of the western worldview, miles of pavements, mines, oil rigs, frack wells flaring methane, industrial sacrifice zones, urban sprawl. Many of the green places are monocrop agriculture — fields or forest plantations toxic with herbicides and nothing to eat. This, the worldview of human exceptionalism, understands land primarily as natural resources, property, capital and ecosystem services . . . My beloved singers navigate this wasteland, looking for a place to rest. They must be as grateful as I for the patchwork of protected land, public and private, refuges, parks and forests. These intact places are ever more critical, not only for shelter for other species but for purifying air, sequestering carbon and making it rain. These are places, islands in a sea of loss, where the birdsong still rises and insects stitch together the fabric of the land, pawprints follow ancient trails, fish still guard the water as they were asked to do and where human people have not forgotten their qifts and their responsibilities."


