BMPC team traveling to Guatemala to visit our sister church, Ebenezer Presbyterian – January 5

Ebenezer Church in San Antonio, Guatemala has been our sister church for 27 years. This partnership is valuable to both our congregations. Many of our members have traveled to learn firsthand what it is like to worship and pray, celebrate, and even grieve alongside this faith filled community. As leaders at Ebenezer describe, "To think of our partnership is to think of our family living abroad... of brothers and sisters who laugh and cry with us and encourage us every day with their love, friendship, testimony and dedication in the missionary work of the visible church of our Lord Jesus Christ."

BMPC supports Ebenezer in many ways. Scholarship money pays for school uniforms, books and fees without which children cannot go to school. We also support health projects and meet immediate medical care needs. Along with our Presbytery, support is also directed to the Microloan Project which allows women to work cooperatively and improve their financial situations.

We continue to emphasize building relationships. A BMPC team will travel to Guatemala in January 2023. The team consists of: Annamarie Arens, Jane Belsches, Mary Carroll Dodd, Xander Dodd, David Carter Florence, Pearl Hall, Weston Hall, Katherine Holman, Aaron Price, and Phin Price. Your support will mean that new Bibles and much needed supplies can be delivered in person! Your support in prayer is important, too. We know they are praying for us!

All this year, **Strategic Planning** has been seeking ways our congregation can continue our mission of welcome. In the fall, we added our name to the **More Light Presbyterian Congregations** in hopes of expressing our openness to all. Being affiliated with other More Light groups means we have access to spiritual, educational, and community building resources. 



Pisgah Legal Services, an innovative nonprofit founded in 1978:

- provides free civil legal aid to people who live in poverty.
- helps more than 20,000 of the most vulnerable people in our communities annually to meet urgent needs such as: housing, safety from abuse, health care and avoiding eviction which often contributes to homelessness.
- partners with dozens of other agencies to make sustainable change for people in crisis.
- **coordinates** the services of approximately 300 pro bono attorneys in WNC.
- **improves** systems and policies that impact the lives of thousands of low-income people.

Pisgah Legal Services provides a broad array of free civil legal aid, anti-poverty advocacy, and access to health care in the 18-county WNC region. Program availability varies by county depending on the availability and scope of funding. Training is provided for volunteers to become navigators who assist clients to sign up for health insurance via the Affordable Care Act which can sometimes be a confusing process.

Pisgah Legal services provided crucial assistance to our Afghan refugee family, the Amirs, in helping them fill out necessary asylum paperwork and ultimately facilitating their travel to Canada where they could settle with family members and a larger Afghan community.

Library News from Sally Woodard

Can you believe that it is 2023? Have you made any New Year's resolutions? Here is one that should be both pleasant and rewarding. Check out a book from the BMPC library. There are many from which to choose. Last month I highlighted memoirs from missionaries associated with BMPC. This month I want to continue to review books that are either by or about more of the numerous authors who have a Black Mountain connection.

One of these is **Martha Jane Petersen**, who has served not only in missions abroad, but also here in the U.S. However, her book, *Imaging My* Inner Fire, which is a memoir, is focused more on the way that creating art is also a calling from God. Martha Jane's speciality, as some of you know, is making quilts. What you may not know is that she felt the desire, even the urge, to do this after retirement. The book not only recounts her journey into this new way of witness to God and beauty, but also has photos of quilts which she has made. This book contains inspiration for both artists and retirees who may feel that they can no longer be productive. [Caveat: The latter hardly applies to BMPC folks, who remain very productive in retirement.

My Cup Overflows by Nada Miyat Barnett is a fascinating memoir of growing up in the thirties and forties and living into the turn of the century. She was a PK, and she describes life in the manse during that time, as well as vacations on a farm where she learned how to milk a cow and the function of an outhouse. In addition, she tells of what it was like to hear the news of Pearl Harbor and to live through the Second World War, with all the stringencies and fear that experience entailed.

The way Nada recorded the events of her life can serve as a good example for all who want to preserve for their family the events of their lives.

Two other books in the Biography section are *Mission to Korea* by Joe B. Hopper and *On the Road Home* by John Russell Frank, known to his friends in Montreat as Rusty. In the former, Joe Hopper tells of his years growing up in Korea as the child of missionaries and then of his own time in Korea as a missionary himself. In a chapter entitled "Pioneer Evangelism in Wartime" he describes his return to the States and life in Montreat. Although most of the book concerns serious aspects of his life, it is obvious that he had a great sense of humor. Rusty Frank's book is about his family's involvement in the Philippines, where the Frank family spent a half-century, including time in a concentration camp.

Finally, a new addition to the library is **Thomas** Ronald Vaughan's The Earth Beneath the Lynching Tree. While not an autobiography, the reader may perceive a few poems as referring to the author. The title of the book comes from poems which describe the wrenching horror of the executions of African-American men. In spite of the discomfort these may give to the reader, it is necessary, I believe, for those of us who follow Christ to try to have some semblance of understanding of this evil inflicted on men of color. There is a great deal of variety in the other poems. BMPC members will identify with "Infant Baptism," and preachers will identify with "Not Taking Myself Too Seriously." Many of them have allusions to famous people or literature or art. As with his other books, this one will also make you think (I quote a BMPC member who has read it.).

Nine things you can do about climate change in 2023

- **1.** Make your voice heard by those in power.
- 2. Eat less meat and dairy.
- **3.** Cut back on flying.
- **4.** Leave the car at home.
- **5.** Reduce your energy use, and bills.
- **6.** Respect and protect green spaces.
- **7.** Invest your money responsibly.
- **8.** Cut consumption and waste.
- **9.** Talk about the changes you make.

This month the Earth Care Book Group has been reading *Saving Us* by climate scientist Katharine Hayhoe. Here is an excerpt:

"As a Christian myself, I find it particularly striking how the Bible talks about fear and action. In the apostle Paul's letter to Timothy, he states simply that God has not given us a spirit of fear. So if we feel fear and respond to climate change out of fear - fear of either the solutions or the overwhelming nature of the impacts that fear is not coming from God. Instead, Paul continues, God has given us a spirit of power, which enables us to act, instead of being frozen or paralyzed. We have been given a spirit of love, to have compassion for others, which means caring for others, putting their needs first as we act. And finally, we have been gifted with a sound mind that we can use to make good decisions based on facts and data that God has given us and made evident to his creation.

So how do we move beyond fear or shame? By acting from love. Love starts with speaking truth: making people fully aware of the risks and the choices they make in a manner that is relevant and practical to them. But it also offers compassion, understanding, and acceptance: the opposite of guilt and shame. Love bolsters our courage, too: what will we not do for those that we love? And finally, it opens the door to that most ephemeral and sought after of emotions: hope."
