This year, our alternative gifting mission partners include Bounty & Soul for hunger relief, Marion Medical Mission for clean water in Africa, SVCM for community homelessness, Presbyterian Disaster Agency for catastrophe relief, Black Mountain Counseling Center for mental health, Bridges To Life and Ministry Of Hope for prison ministry, our BMPC Weekday School and Iglesian Ebenezer, Guatemala for Christian education, and our undesignated category which is designated to areas of great need by our Mission Team. True faith does not stay locked within the walls of a church building. It reaches out to people who are hurting and facing injustice. What was that postcard all about?

A few weeks ago, Earth Care folks greeted people coming to Sunday worship, asking for their signatures on a petition and a postcard. Maybe you wondered why we were doing that and if it did any good. Here's your answer.

The petition supported an initiative to reduce single-use plastics like shopping bags and straws in Black Mountain. We hoped to influence our Town Council and ultimately Buncombe County Commissioners to pass a county-wide resolution. We delivered the petitions to Town Council. They supported the initiative and sent it to the County Commissioners, who added it to the agenda for their next meeting. Then legislators from Raleigh stepped in.

Just before the state budget was voted into law, those in power tacked on an amendment prohibiting entities below the state level, like towns or counties, from enacting restrictions on single-use plastics. Armed with a supermajority to override the Governor's veto, they passed it into law. The amendment is being challenged, but for now it stands. In the meantime we're encouraging merchants to take action reducing those single-use plastics, and encouraging individuals to use alternatives to them whenever possible.

The postcard referred to the "Food for Peace" provision in the Farm Bill, up for renewal this year. Food for Peace includes nutrition assistance for the poor in the US and in areas around the world faced with hunger as a result of war, famine, or natural disaster. A resolution to eliminate Food for Peace from the Farm Bill was due for a vote in late September. Our postcards urged our Congressional Representative to support the program by voting against its removal.

In late September the House voted down the resolution for removal thanks in large part to the 130 Representatives who crossed party lines to support Food for Peace. Our Representative,

Chuck Edwards, was not one of them. A letter to Rep. Edwards expressing disappointment with his vote is on its way to his office as I write this.

We will continue to encourage legislation that protects our planet and its people. As Christians we're called to care for all God's world and for our neighbors as ourselves. Engaging with political decision makers is a powerful way to put our faith into action.




BMPC Solar Panel Report energy captured in September, 2023

Welcome back to the newly renovated library!







If you have not seen it yet, do drop by. All the books are back on the shelves; there is beautiful new and comfortable furniture; and the mail boxes are now located there. There are a few new books, about which I would like to tell you.

In the section of BMPC authors, there are two almost "right off the press" books which I have found very interesting. To add to his other works, Ronald Vaughan has written another book of poetry, *Mary Pondered, Sarah Laughed*. If you are not a fan of poetry, I would challenge you to read some of the ones in this volume. As you might imagine, it does contain Biblical selections. There is not only the one in the title, but there are others, e.g., ones about David and Judas, references to specific verses in Scripture, and perhaps even some theology in unlikely places.

Vaughan pays tribute often to other writers and recounts historic events with his own inimitable view. One of my favorites in the latter category is "Rosa Parks." The last few lines are stunning. There are personal poems, or so he makes them seem. You may find, as I did, one in particular, which speaks to your life. Check it out and see for yourself.

Another extremely thought-provoking book is by Anna Carter Florence, Columbia Seminary professor and wife of our own pastor David. Anna Carter Florence's *A Is For Alabaster* is another recent publication. She divides the book into two sections: Old Testament and New Testament. She then proceeds to use the alphabet to examine people or things from each Testament. Both descriptive and provocative, she helps the reader to see the subjects more profoundly, often in a new light. Presbyterian Women will be especially interested in the references which may enlighten Lesson Three and Seven in their Bible study for this year. Many readers often ignore a preface and introduction in a book. Do not ignore the one in this book. Anna gives some unusual insight into the development of her own love of Scripture and how it has impacted her life.

The library has obtained another of Professor Carter Florence's books, *Rehearsing Scripture*. In it, she describes a way for groups to study the Bible as a drama. I found it fascinating and think that it would be an excellent resource for a class. She entices readers to make Scripture come alive — to use an idiom, "to leap off the page."

All of these will be found, for now, on the cart immediately to the left as you come into the library. On the top shelf there is a small box in which to put the checkout card and space in which to return the book. Later, they will be shelved with the other BMPC authors.

BMPC TIME CAPSULE

A decrepit tin can, mauve with earthen patina; an ancient brown outlet cover made from Bakelite plastic – mildewed and sooty; the top of a glass Pepsi bottle, shorn off and hastily discarded by some tired laborer a lifetime ago, lying in wait as if it yearned to become seaglass. These are the goods I stole from the dirt under the old chancel platform.

The framers of the new platform told me churches often have fancy steel canisters for time capsules that they'll lay in their chancel or stage foundations. This is Black Mountain, so I rustled up an old plastic container and we committed the following:

From Mary Katherine and David: a letter describing the handprints in the new concrete under the platform, and a photo

From our clerk of session: statistical reports and minutes

From our interim treasurer: a letter to a future church treasurer

From Aaron: a copy of his CD, Offerings, and the church newsletter from when he was hired

From Brittany: art from the children of the church

From Sam: a letter to the future director of operations or property committee

From Jackie: copies of some of her favorite bulletin covers

From the church: an old Bible with the church's name embossed into the cover, a centennial celebration commemorative plaque and 75th anniversary commemorative plate, a photo of the old chancel area, a printed email from one of the original builders of our organ pipe housing in 1978

So where will the church be in 70 years? What are we doing right now to lay that foundation? Let us lay only a few cheap memories away under the chancel platform, and focus on what is happening on and around it. I think our church is at a crossroads, a crucial juncture in time. What an opportunity we have, to build this future together. What a legacy we can leave.



Where are you connected to the ministries, to the programming our church is hosting right now? What can each of us contribute to support them? When I think of the future of our world, my thoughts turn to RAD! Wednesdays and how many kids are in the building every week: laughing, learning, singing, playing. I am reminded of how our facility is used by Bounty & Soul every week to teach and to empower, by AA every week to change lives, by the Girl Scouts to build a generation of leaders. I see the children of the Weekday School walking past my office window every day, mouths open in awe and smiling wonder. What a future we are building together already. This is our collective time capsule.
