Summer of 2023 a Wake-Up Call?

Friends, we have seen the headlines all summer:

"Record heat wave illuminates plight of poorest Americans"

"101F in the ocean off Florida"

"Phoenix marks 31 days with 110F"

"Smoke from hundreds of Canadian wildfires blankets northern U.S. cities with air pollution"

"US leads the world in weather disasters"

"Asheville airport sets passenger record in 2022"

"Vulnerable Greenland ice portends bad news for us"

"Hottest days on record: Tuesday tops all-time world high set a day earlier"

"Study: Carbon dioxide in air hits new peak: Levels in atmosphere highest in 4 million years"

In our all-church read last spring, Katharine Hayhoe told us exactly what we can do:

First, talk about the climate crisis. If we are already talking with each other, great! But the country needs a huge groundswell from the public – from people who are suffering and from church members on behalf of people and critters who are suffering. To achieve this, we need to talk especially to government officials and leaders of organizations.

Second, live more simply. If we are already using the many tips we shared during our discussions last spring – changing thermostat settings, hanging laundry, and so on – great! But every one of us can challenge ourselves more, even if it's inconvenient. Drive less. Fly less. Buy less. Sacrifice something. Our grandmothers were right: "Use it up, wear it out, just make do, or do without."

Third, become politically active. Politicians don't actually lead in doing hard things. The people have to lead, then politicians follow. We lead by flooding legislators with calls, postcards, letters; and by VOTING.

BMPC Responds

Our petition to reduce single-use plastics and styrofoam containers, with 114 signatures, was delivered to Town Council at the September 11 meeting. The Council adopted the resolution and sent it to the Buncombe County Commissioners, to be considered at their September meeting. Your support helped make this happen – thank you!

We are also sending postcards to Rep. Chuck Edwards urging him to support the "Food for Peace" program included in the 2023 Farm Bill. We plan to have outreach actions like these after church on a regular basis, and we invite you to join us!

Faith Builders class (upstairs, first room on left) will study the series *The Enigmatic Parables of* a Controversial Rabbi: Short Stories by Jesus by Amy-Jill Levine, New Testament and Jewish Studies Professor at Vanderbilt Divinity School in Nashville. AJ, as she is called, invites us to reconsider several familiar parables from Matthew, Mark, and Luke, and to discover how challenging these stories are. She will give us the Biblical and historical context of the stories and show us how to situate the parable in its original form, how first century Jewish listeners might have heard it as Jesus told the story. We will explore both the meaning in its original form and how we might interpret that story for us today and be challenged by it.

Class members will need to order the Participants Guide online or at your local bookstore. Come join our class for study, discussion, fellowship, and lots of laughter.

Because this is a class led group, members who choose and feel comfortable facilitating will sign up for a session. The church will provide the Leaders' Guide, (written by a Presbyterian minister) as well as the DVD with AJ giving us the context for us to wrestle with and for folks to use as a reference. There is plenty of material for facilitators to work from and lead discussions.
