Sharing Epiphany

I've been thinking a lot about Epiphany as we prepare to say goodbye to 2017 and welcome a new year here at BMPC. In one of my daily devotionals, the author reflects upon epiphany as "The Life-light that gets shared beyond." The word beyond is a metaphor for what's next, of course, after the manger and Christmas.

As I write this letter, we are a week out from that magnificent scene of the birth of Jesus and I am now beginning to think about those three wise men that had the courage to follow the star. They didn't know what they were headed into but they knew the star was shining bright and that it meant something. And they went searching for it.

It occurs to me that as we prepare for Epiphany and the 2018 New Year this story bears deep, rich meaning for the church today. The larger Church is experiencing a decline of denominational membership and affiliation is paralleled by an increase in the unaffiliated – the "nones," as we've taken to calling them. The "nones" are those who claim no particular allegiance to any faith system in general or house of worship in particular. And by and far, the church hasn't known how to respond to this disenfranchised population.

Our session, program staff, and members of our Strategic Ministry Team will be focusing our annual retreat this year on how the church is shifting in culture and context and **how, what, where, and when** are the ways in which the body of Christ of BMPC is called to respond to this SHIFT? Even though the future represents uncharted territory, will we have the courage, like the wise men before us, to follow the star of Christ?

When visitors follow the star to find us at BMPC, will they find Jesus here? Will word get out, like that bright star, that our church is the place to come if you want to embrace whatever struggles you have in matters of faith, because we embrace you as you are.

As we enter into the new year of 2018, may we venture together to be "The Life-light that gets shared beyond."

Mission is the church and is integral to all we do.



John McCall was the pastor at BMPC from 1989 through 1996. He now supports pastors of the Presbyterian Church of Taiwan (PCT) in a country where only 3 percent of the population is Christian. Outreach in Taiwan can be challenging and the possibility of burnout is high. In groups, John and the pastors pray, read Scripture, and dream. They encourage each other to be faithful and visionary leaders. John also works with the native Taiwanese (aboriginals) who have been most open to the gospel, but also the most marginalized people on the island. In addition, John teaches at all three seminaries of the PCT and leads conferences for youth and young adults.

We have set aside **January 21-February 11** to celebrate BMPC's commitment to outreach and global mission. Missionary to Taiwan, **John McCall** will kick off the season by preaching and leading adult church school on **January 21**, and, at **Thursday Night Live, January 25**, will share the work he does among the people of Taiwan. **January 28**, will be a big day in the life of the church including **Jessi Stitt's sharing her stories** of her work with Marion Medical mission as the Moment for Mission, the **annual congregational meeting**, and the youth sponsored **potato lunch** which raises money for youth mission throughout the year. **February 5**, further highlights youth involvement in mission as they collect cans of soup and money for SVCM as a part of **Souper Bowl Sunday**. During Mission Season we will also be working with the congregations of BM United Methodist Church and Christ Community Church to provide a place to stay for currently homeless women who are working their way to permanent housing through **Homeward Bound**. This effort affords many opportunities for hands-on service in the community. Mission Season will culminate on the afternoon of **February 11**, with **Rise Against Hunger** (formerly Stop Hunger Now). This year, as a result of a gift that supports this project, we will pack 20,000 meals.

BMPC members serve in many ways throughout the year, throughout the community and support mission outside our physical reach through those who work in the world.
Mission is the center of our worship life. During Mission Season we celebrate our work and rededicate our efforts to be God's hands and feet.

LIBRARY NOTES

2018 – Is THIS the Year?

Is this the year you finally decide to write your life story? Have you thought about it over and over, but never quite gotten started? Have you made lists and notes? You just need inspiration and a pattern.

In our library are many examples of personal biographies. Some are long and elaborate, and others are short and very personal. All are extremely interesting. Examine the examples on display to see how each person organized his or her book. Some are self-published, while others are professionally done. Look over the ones listed below and others on the shelves; get a plan that appeals to you – and START WRITING.

Faith Skepstad Bradley's *With God's Song in My Heart* is a chronological story about her grandparents, her parents, and her own life as missionaries in China and Taiwan. The book covers many years and generations from 1890-2015.

John Russell Frank's *On the Road Home: An American Story: A Memior of Triumph and Tragedy on a Forgotten Frontier* uses diaries, letters, photographs, and interviews for his history.

Jane Elizabeth Frist has written two books of her childhood and her love for MRA: *Montreat, How Love You!* and *Lady, I've Seen Enough*. Both include humorous incidents, photographs, original poems and sketches.

Joseph M. Gettys's book, *My Cup Runs Over: "Life Is Full, Life Is Fun,"* narrates his experiences as a family member, student, pastor, teacher, and professor in an informal and

personal style, as if he were talking to the reader in an interview or letter.

Ursula Neuberg's *Memoirs of Her Youth During the War Years in Germany* was hand written, and friends helped her edit and publish her story. It is spiral-bound and has a picture of the painting she did of our Church.

Martha Jane Petersen's *Imaging My Inner Fire* is a record of her personal journey and "surprising adventure into art through twists and turns, questions and doubts." The book has photos of some of her exquisite "improvisational art quilts."

Mariella Talmage Provost's *I Gave You to the Lord* is written in a different way, as each chapter is a separate incident. Carol Talmage helped her in recording her life of Christian service. Using this practical approach means that each chapter can be written independently and then later put in an appropriate order.

Kenneth M. Scott's *Around the World in Eighty Years* is the story of his amazing life of "Medicine, Missions, Music," which took him completely around the world six times and halfway twenty-two times. This book is written in detail in chronological order.

Mary McPhail Standaert's *The Montreat Gateboys and Their Stories* is a history of the boys who spent their summers giving directions, collecting fees, opening and closing the famous Montreat gates from 1913 to 1969. The book is a collection of interviews and pictures.

PW of WNC Presbytery Scholarships

The Presbyterian Women of Western NC offer 2 scholarships of \$1,500 each. Applicants must be members of a Presbyterian Church of the Presbytery of WNC, prove financial need, have graduated from an accredited high school or preparatory school, qualified for admission to an accredited institution of higher learning or are presently enrolled in a four-year program of undergraduate study. Applicants must plan to enroll in a four-year degree program. Technical or graduate schools are excluded from consideration. The application form, school transcript(s), and recommendation letters must be received by the Presbytery Scholarship Committee by February 15, 2018 to be considered for a scholarship for the following school year. The January Series features one of the most influential scientific minds, a New York Times best-selling author and a former technology adviser to the White House. Room In The Inn

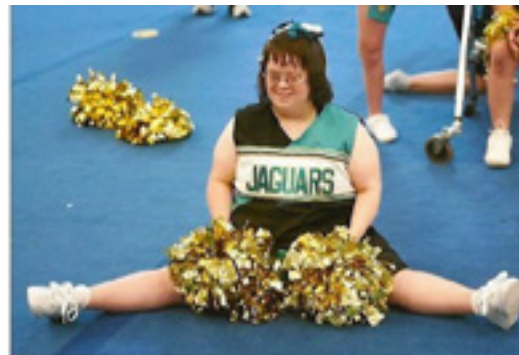
